Re: Response to Jeffrey D. Rosen, M.D.,  
Applicant for Vermont Licensure

Dear Dr. Rosen:

The Licensing Committee and the Vermont Board of Medical Practice is in receipt of your April 19, 2010 response to the Notice of Preliminary Denial sent to you on March 29, 2010. In your reply you state: (1) that you choose not to exercise your right to a hearing within thirty days of the Board's preliminary denial of your application for licensure, and; (2) that you request that the Board allow you to withdraw your 2009 application for licensure.

The Committee noted that in your response, you affirmatively state: "*I do not request a review of this preliminary decision by the Board.*" As you wish, no hearing will be scheduled in this matter and the Board's preliminary denial was adopted as its final decision<sup>1</sup> on July 7, 2010.

As to your request to withdraw your application, following deliberation by the Licensing Committee and its recommendation, the Board has denied your request. Under Vermont law, the Licensing Committee may reject an applicant's request to withdraw their application<sup>2</sup> for medical licensure. This is the Board's final action and this matter is closed.
